INTERDISCIPLINARY STUDIES: LATIN AMERICAN AND TRANSATLANTIC STUDIES (LATS)

Minor in Latin American and Transatlantic Studies

Students will explore Latin America and related transatlantic connections through the lens of multiple disciplines. This approach will provide a basis for a more holistic understanding of Latin America and interactions across the Atlantic. Touching on issues such as structures of power, representation, appropriation and adaptation, syncretism, identity, gender, ecology, and religion, students will develop an increased awareness of Latin America and a more global perspective on cultural and biological differences. In this context, Latin America includes the diverse regions of Mexico, Central America, South America, and the Caribbean as well as Latinos in the United States. Fluency in French, Portuguese, or Spanish as well as experiential learning (study abroad in Latin America and related transatlantic connections) is encouraged.

Requirements for the minor

Students must complete at least18 hours distributed as follows: one course in French, Portuguese or Spanish at or beyond the 200-level, and additional courses from the electives listed below. The courses must be chosen from at least three disciplines. Only one of the courses used for the Latin American and Transatlantic Studies minor may be used to satisfy major or other minor requirements. Appropriate courses may be substituted with prior approval from the program director. Note: students are responsible for completing required prerequisites.

University-wide minimum requirements for a minor: 1) one-half of the hours required for a minor must be completed in residence at UNC Asheville, to include at least 6 hours at the 300-400 level; 2) students must have a cumulative grade-point-average of at least 2.0 on minor courses taken at UNC Asheville.

Impact Statement: The Latin American and Transatlantic Studies minor is interdisciplinary. Since faculty members from multiple departments are already teaching the diverse number of courses to be incorporated into the minor, the impact on institutional resources is minimal. The addition of this minor would make a positive impact in increasing enrollment in interdisciplinary courses with Latin American and related transatlantic content.

Rationale: Latin American Studies is a well-recognized and highly regarded minor at liberal arts universities across the country. The addition of "Transatlantic" to the title not only responds to a recent scholarly inclination to include connections of other countries across the Atlantic with Latin American but also serves to address the significance of these specific interactions from the colonial period to the present.

Since the minor has a multidisciplinary focus (i.e., encouraging "connections through the lens of multiple disciplines—from political and economic systems or historical, environmental, and social developments to achievements in literature and the arts--providing the basis for a more holistic understanding of Latin America"), students are required to take courses from at least three disciplines.

At UNC Asheville, our liberal arts students would benefit enormously from a Latin American and Transatlantic Studies minor. The interdisciplinary perspective of this minor would offer students important opportunities including the ability to acquire considerable knowledge of this rising region, to develop an increased awareness of diversity through a more global perspective on cultural and biological differences, and to travel and become proficient in the languages of Spanish, Portuguese, and French. The proposed Latin American and Transatlantic Studies minor is consistent with the goals of the UNC Asheville mission statement in encouraging students to understand the connections between disciplines and to recognize and promote human diversity. A Latin American and Transatlantic Studies minor would connect with the goals of UNC Tomorrow in giving students necessary skills to succeed in this rapidly growing global community.

The following courses will be taught by new and established faculty but cannot be included in the list above as they are going to be taught as Special Topics courses:
