VI. Administration/Academic Affairs:

Provost Joseph Urgo

<u>Meeting with Adjuncts.</u> The Provost attended a meeting organized by Tracey Rizzo to gather adjuncts from across campus to get acquainted and share stories. Provost Urgo said this is a very positive group of people.

<u>SACS fifth year review.</u> The fifth year review is coming up. Provost Urgo hopes each department talks about this and encourages senators to begin discussions. Jessica Stowell has planning well under way. Provost Urgo went to a SACS meeting last September where he was pleased with our excellent reputation with SACS for being on top of these things. Provost Urgo had a conversation regarding Dr. Lisa Friedenberg's presentation. They told the provost that we should be thankful for having such a national expert on our faculty. Provost Urgo appreciates external affirmations of the work we are doing.

<u>Humanities support.</u> In the past, we have talked about structuring the Humanities program so the director does not have to spend extensive time going from department to department seeking faculty to teach in this

program. We are working on a two-part policy. One part is called "Humanities Fellows" which designates junior faculty who are interested in the Humanities program to receive release time to get acclimated to teach in the program. The other part is called "Humanities Affiliates." This program is for those experienced in the Humanities program. The program spells out a commitment for the next few years in regards to teaching duties in the Humanities program. They will receive the designate, "Humanities Affiliated Faculty." The program will make planning more efficient for Department chairs as well as staff the Humanities program with fulltime faculty as well as adjuncts. Not to say that adjuncts do not do a good job, these two policies/programs will give us a balanced mix of adjuncts and fulltime faculty which sends a message to students that the Humanities program is important to this university and is staffed by fulltime faculty as well as adjuncts.

Graduate Programs. Provost Urgo wonders if it is less important to talk about graduate programs in general and more important to talk about them specifically. If a department feels it has a program that would benefit students to offer at the graduate level, Provost Urgo does not believe we are categorically opposed for we already have graduate programs. The risk in talking about graduate programs in general is we do not want to get in a position where every department has to have a graduate program for he feels that is contrary to our mission. However, there may be one to three departments from among the 30 departments we have that do feel they could offer something to their students. What distresses Provost Urgo is hearing students coming back for a fifth year to earn a second B.A. degree or they go to an inferior program in the Asheville area doing their work there when he knows we could do a better job here. Provost Urgo would like to have an environment where we support academic entrepreneurs who want to present an offering at the graduate level which is small and keeping in our mission.. Many liberal arts universities around the country have a few very selective offerings that they become known and they stake their reputations on those areas.

Student Rating of Instruction. Provost Urgo met with the Student Rating of Instruction task force recently which Karin Peterson and Evelyn Chiang chair. They had a very interesting discussion. Provost Urgo was responsible for putting Hamilton's online system in place. What attracted him the most to it was the data you could extract from the online system. Provost Urgo said the primary purpose of a SRI is developmental, to make us better teachers. One semester of information means little. However, if you can extract 5-6 semesters worth of data, then you begin to learn something that is developmentally advantageous. We need to work harder to mine the data within the SRI system so that it is more useful to us where certain questions are compared with a field of colleagues. If a colleague is off the charts in one area, then we can learn from that. The instrument is not to be used to jeopardize a faculty member's career due to unhappy students one semester. As far as evaluating professors, SRIs are one among many factors that we evaluate, and they are not the most reliable. Provost Urgo was impressed with the thinking of the SRI task force on how we can get the most useful information.

Dr. Marietta Cameron asked Provost Urgo what instruments does he consider to be more reliable. Provost Urgo said there really aren't any reliable instruments because observations change the nature of what is being observed. The most meaningful to Provost Urgo is what the faculty member says they learned from the observation and the changes they made in response to that. The response loop is the most meaningful part. Teaching is notoriously difficult to assess. You know when it is a disaster and you know when it is stellar. Between those two poles, it is really difficult to assess with accuracy – although of course we will continue to try to do so. .

Regarding release time in the Humanities program, Dr. Chris Bell asked if this was something Academic Affairs would put money toward or will the departments have to find ways to create the release time. Provost Urgo said Academic Affairs will want to put adjunct budget funds toward that release time.
