Statement of Faculty Senate Action:

## APC Document 37 (LL/GERM): Change the major and minor requirements for German

## Effective Date: Fall 2023

1. Delete: On page 212, the requirements for a Major in Languages and Literatures with a Concentration in German:
I. Required courses in the concentration-38 hours: LL 313; GERM 210, 220, 310, 320, 490, 16 additional hours at the 300-400 level, to include at least 4 hours at the 400 -level. Students whose level of proficiency does not allow them to start with GERM 210 will be required to complete the appropriate prerequisite courses. Students who place out of one or more of the required courses must still complete 36 hours of German, not including the prerequisite courses, for the concentration. At least one-half of the hours required for the concentration must be completed at UNC Asheville.
II. Required courses outside the major-None.
III. Other departmental requirements-Competency in German will be demonstrated by a capstone project consisting of research plus oral presentations to be carried out in GERM 490. Oral proficiency will be demonstrated by successful completion of GERM 320.

Add: On page 212, in place of deleted entry:
I. Required courses in the concentration-38 hours: LL 313; GERM 110, 120, 210, 220, 310, $320,490,8$ additional hours at the 300-400 level. Students who place out of one or more of the required courses must still complete 36 hours of German for the concentration. At least one-half of the hours required for the concentration must be completed at UNC Asheville.
II. Required courses outside the major-None.
III. Other departmental requirements-Competency in German will be demonstrated by a capstone project consisting of research plus oral presentations to be carried out in GERM 490. Oral proficiency will be demonstrated by successful completion of GERM 320.
2. Delete: On page 213, the requirements for a Minor in German:

German: 22 hours: LL 313; GERM 210, 220, 310, 320, and one course from 390, 490 or 499. Students whose level of proficiency does not allow them to start with GERM 210 will be required to complete the appropriate prerequisite courses. Students who place out of one or more of the required courses must still complete 20 hours of German for the minor.

Add: On page 213, in place of deleted entry:
German: 22 hours: LL 313; GERM 110, 120, 210, 220, and one course from 310, 320, or 390. Students who place out of one or more of the required courses must still complete 20 hours of German for the minor.

Impact Statement: The impact of the proposed curricular changes will be beneficial to both students and faculty. The total hours required for students to complete the German major or minor will remain the same at 38 and 22, respectively. By including GERM 110 and 120 in the credit hours for the major or minor rather than as prerequisites for entry into the program, and reducing the number of required upperlevel courses, students who begin studying German at UNC Asheville will need eight fewer credit hours in German to complete the major or minor (see Tables 1 and 2 in Appendix). This change will make the degree program more accessible to students, especially those without prior knowledge of German and/or those minoring or double majoring in the subject. With this increased accessibility, we anticipate greater enrollment in German classes beyond the 100 -level and an increase in the number of German majors and minors.

As no new courses will be added to the curriculum, we anticipate that current faculty resources will be sufficient to cover the necessary courses each semester. Faculty workload will be reduced by the decreased need for independent studies. Current enrollment and faculty resources in the German program allow for two 300-400 level classes to be offered each semester, including GERM 310 and 320, which students can take only once for credit. With the present major/minor requirements, students often need to take more 300-400 level courses than the Department of Languages and Literatures is capable of offering, necessitating frequent independent study courses. Such courses are often undesirable, as they (a) provide less opportunity for student engagement, (b) demand uncompensated labor from faculty, and (c) remove the social and communicative classroom setting that language courses in particular benefit from. The proposed changes will significantly reduce, if not entirely eliminate, the need for students to take independent studies in order to attain the credit hours necessary for the major or minor, in turn relieving the strain frequent independent studies place on faculty.

Rationale: The decision to include GERM 110 and 120 in the German major and minor while maintaining the same number of overall credit hours for both is intended to serve three main purposes: (1) to align more appropriately with the German program's revised curriculum; (2) to increase the accessibility and feasibility of the German major and minor for students; (3) to enable more students to double major in German and another subject.

1) Alignment with German program's revised curriculum - Over the past few years, the German Program in the Department of Languages and Literatures has undergone a systematic reworking of our curriculum in keeping with the most recent research on pedagogy pertaining to adult foreign language study, as well as with the ever-increasing importance of intercultural and global competence.

A significantly revised GERM 110 curriculum was implemented in Fall 2020 and a similar revision was introduced in GERM 120 the following semester. This new 100 -level curriculum is contentoriented from the beginning. It is based on a holistic model of language learning that dispenses with the once standard division between lower-level "language" courses, in which grammar and vocabulary are taught and learned without any readily discernible connection to content, and upper-
level "content" courses, in which culture and literature are taught and learned under the assumption that language is sufficiently acquired. Rather, language and intellectual content are integrated and taught concurrently throughout the German program.

Our curriculum is rooted in a conceptual framework that understands language as functional, contextualized, and meaning- and discourse-oriented, rather than formal, generalized, and ruleoriented. At all stages of language development, our curriculum prioritizes the complex relationships between meaning and form, asking students to analyze and interrogate the function and potential of language itself. Through an explicit foregrounding of language and its purposeful integration with cultural content, the German program invites students to explore the contingent nature of cultural concepts such as knowledge, identity, and power, and to examine how these are socially and linguistically produced, maintained, and challenged.

The academic rigor and intellectual engagement demanded by GERM 110 and 120 are comparable to that of introductory classes in other subjects and should therefore similarly count towards the major and minor in this field.
2) Increased accessibility and feasibility of the German major and minor - Requiring 38 SCH , the German program rests firmly in the middle of Humanities majors in terms of credit hours, as shown in Table 3 in the Appendix. However, because students currently must complete two four-credit hour courses of prerequisites (GERM 110 and 120), the total number of credit hours necessary to complete a degree in German for students entering UNC Asheville with no prior German instruction rises from the nominal 38 to 46 . This is a greater amount of required credit hours than any other Humanities major. This disparity is even starker when examining required course hours for minors. At 22 SCH , the German minor requires an average amount of credit hours for minors offered at UNC Asheville. When the eight prerequisite hours are added, the German minor rises to 30 total credit hours, which along with French, is the greatest number of total credit hours required by any minor at UNC Asheville (see Table 4 in Appendix).

While the Spanish and French majors and minors likewise require prerequisites (SPAN/FREN 110 and 120 or SPAN/FREN 130), it is typically possible for students to take introductory Spanish and French classes during high school and to place into higher levels upon entering UNC Asheville. This is less feasible for students of German, given that German language courses are offered at increasingly fewer high schools. Spanish classes are offered in all Buncombe County and Asheville City High Schools and French in about half. In contrast, no high school in the county or city school system offers German classes. The American Association of Teachers of German (AATG) collected data on German programs in schools and universities in the United States, and only 20 public and four private high schools in the state of North Carolina offer German courses. ${ }^{1}$ The majority of these are located in Charlotte and the Triangle region, with only one high school located in Lenoir offering German in Western North Carolina. Out of North Carolina's nearly 1000 high schools, only 2\% offer students the opportunity to complete German courses before entering college.

[^0]This means that the vast majority of our students in the German program start in GERM 110. Treating GERM 110 and 120 as prerequisites rather than major or minor courses puts these students at a disadvantage compared to their peers from other Humanities degree programs, including those in the Department of Languages and Literatures studying Spanish or French. Including GERM 110 and 120 in the German major and minor will allow more students to enroll in and complete these degree paths once they enter university. Tables 5 and 6 in the Appendix depict matriculation models for the German major for both traditional students and those who transfer into UNC Asheville, respectively.
3) Ability for more students to double major - Many students who major in a language also double major in another subject. A 2012 report from the liberal arts-focused Teagle Foundation on the prevalence and impact of double majors found that foreign languages are the most popular concentration among students with a double major, appearing in six out of the top ten most common double major concentrations. However, languages are comparatively less often chosen as a single major, with only $1.7 \%$ of single majors choosing a language as their major and $10.5 \%$ of double majors choosing a language. ${ }^{2}$

As most UNC Asheville courses are four credit hours, students typically enroll in four courses a semester, amounting to about 32 courses before graduation. Under a three-credit hour system, students take five courses each semester, for a total of 40 courses. Our four-credit hour system, while certainly beneficial in many ways, makes double majoring or even sometimes minoring in a subject more difficult, as our students take eight fewer classes.

Reducing the total number of courses needed to major in German will result in an increased opportunity for students to double major in German and another program. This will increase enrollment in 200-400 level German courses and help further UNC Asheville's mission as the only designated liberal arts university in the UNC system by enabling students to gain in-depth knowledge in multiple disciplines.
